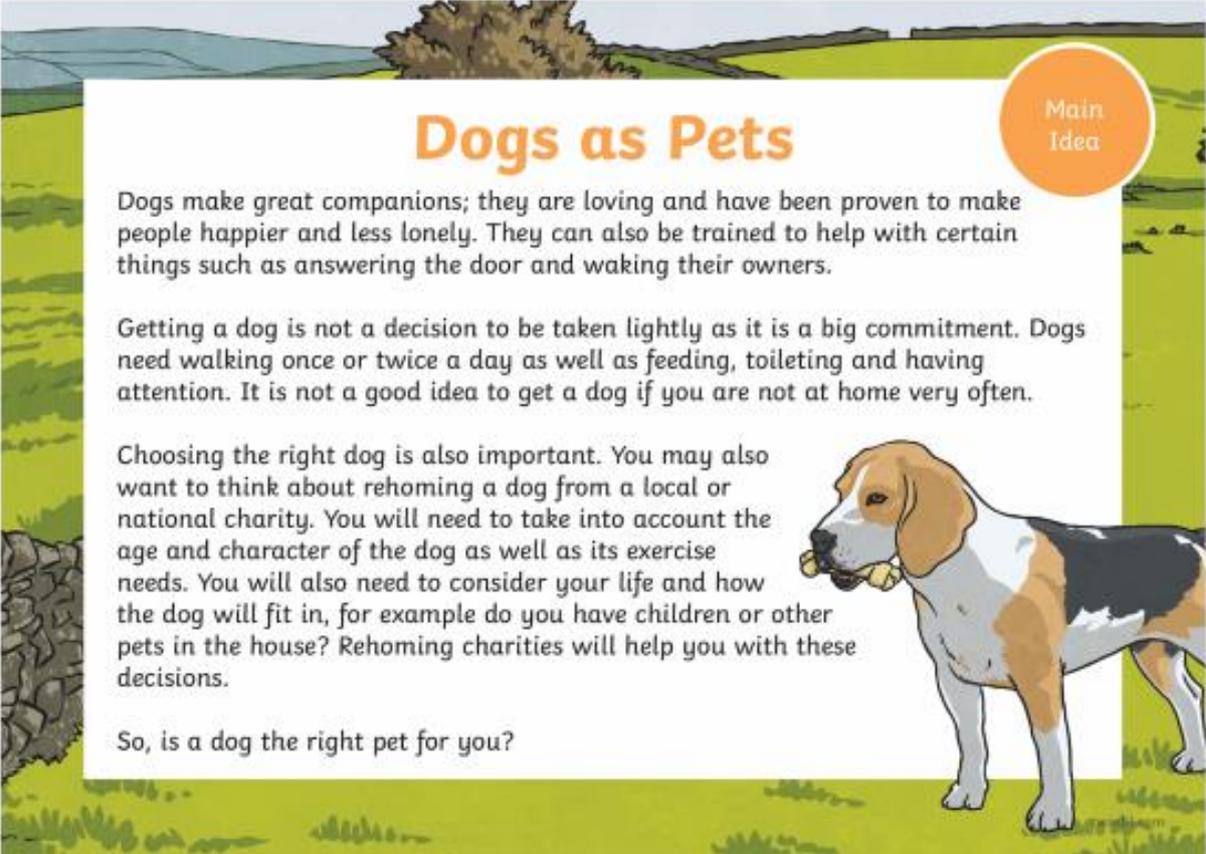

Dogs as Pets
